Parish of the Epiphany Faith at Home: Week of February 06, 2022 Storymakers Stars Chapter: 10 The Ladder

Overview

We continue with the story of Jacob, the grandson of Abraham and son of Isaac. Jacob, we'll remember, has not been treating his family with kindness or integrity. Because of his jealousy of his elder brother, he tricked Esau; he tricked his father; and now he's had to run away out of fear of his brother, who is filled with rage and anger. Today, we meet several new characters in our story, and the tables are turned on tricky Jacob. But we also see a very important, very clear picture of who God is.

Our takeaways include

For the first couple chapters of Jacob's story, God was whispering to Jacob that there were better ways to handle his bad feelings, and that Jacob didn't need to be jealous of his brother Esau; God made Jacob special, too. Jacob didn't listen, and he got himself into trouble. In today's story, God stopped whispering and started to make sure Jacob listens. And the most important thing God wanted Jacob to hear was: God loves him and won't ever leave him. We'll see as we continue that God has big plans for Jacob and his family; but sometimes God's plan can be hard to see, like camouflage.

Stars Chapter 10: The Ladder

Start with the picture on page 79.

What do we see in this picture? Does this give you a clue about our story?

Read the story together on pages 81-82. There's a lot going on today!

Jacob runs away after he tricks Isaac; and he has a dream that God speaks to him.

What does God say?

After everything that's happened so far, is that what you expected God to say to Jacob?

What do we learn about God here?

God isn't angry. God doesn't say I told you so. God doesn't say 'Jacob you're a mess and it's all your fault.' None of that. God says, 'Jacob, I will not leave you.'

Wow. There's a really important truth about God.

After his dream, Jacob goes to his uncle's house. After working for seven years to marry Rachel, Uncle Laban tricks Jacob into marrying someone he doesn't want to marry.


saac grew up healthy and strong and had two sons, Esau and Jacob. One day, the brothers
