




Confirmation and Confirmation Recognition

Music Notes from Yesterday Morning

David Eaton, Director of Music and Organist, offered the following notes regarding the music that was sung at the 10:00am worship yesterday.

The offertory anthem, *Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies* by Harold Darke, is a standard of the mainstream parish church choir repertoire, but interestingly this anthem has not appeared in a published collection for a while. Quite possibly, Darke's most well-known anthem, *In the Bleak Midwinter*, is traditionally sung at Christmas.

The sacred music of the English composer and organist Harold Darke (1888-1976) is among the core repertoire of Anglican choirs today. Darke was born in Highbury, London; he received his formal music education at the Royal College of Music and studied composition with Charles Villiers Stanford at Oxford. Darke later served as professor of organ at the Royal College of Music from 1919 to 1969. During his lifetime, Darke was considered among the finest organists in England. He held organist positions at Emmanuel Church, West Hampstead, St. James, Paddington, and briefly deputized as the Director of Music at King's College, Cambridge during World War II. For fifty years, Darke was the organist at St. Michael's Church, Cornhill from 1916 to 1966. St. Michael's is a medieval, Anglo-Catholic, High Church parish in London that can trace its history to the early twelfth century. Darke initiated a lunchtime organ recital series at St. Michael's in 1916 that established him as a city institution. This recital series has continued under the leadership of his successors to the present day. Additionally, Darke founded the St. Michael's Singers and presented

known contemporary composers.



Mission & Outreach Awards Grant for Syrian Refugees

During the past year, the Mission & Outreach Committee has explored ways that Epiphany could respond to the devastating Syrian refugee crisis. While researching avenues to assist with refugee resettlement here, we were presented with an immediate opportunity in Europe. Many Parishioners will remember the moving adult formation presentation by Beth Domig, Rich Goldhor's sister. Beth and her husband Arthur live in Salzburg, Austria and are deeply involved in welcoming the flood of refugees. Ultimately, they took two refugee brothers from Syria into their home and have been supporting their integration into the culture of Austria.



The boys are enrolled in an intensive German course that meets 3hrs/day, 5days/week and is not cheap. In June, Rich presented a grant request to Mission & Outreach on behalf of *Family Plus*, a non-profit organization started by the Domigs and friends to support such efforts. The Mission and Outreach Committee voted to award a grant of \$3000 to *Family Plus*, specifically directed to keep the boys in the language program until the end of 2016. Once they have reached a level of fluency, there will be various doors open to them to become integrated into Austrian society. Khaled could enroll at the University to work on his Master's Degree in Chemistry, and Hobi could learn a trade. Hurricane Relief Update



Hurricane Matthew devastated the southwestern departments in Haiti. A country that is this very poor, and was just beginning to recover from the 2010 earthquake, was again knocked to the ground. The need for immediate relief in the form of food, shelter, clean water, and sanitation is enormous. To add to the country's misery, cholera, introduced to Haiti following the earthquake, is on the rise.

Epiphany has a special connection with Haiti through our medical mission teams, which have worked in rural villages around the city of Leogane for six years. Our response to this recent disaster reflects that care. A special collection for Haiti Hurricane Relief was offered at the 10:00am service on 9 October. With great generosity, the Parish contributed \$3,000 - thank you. On Tuesday, 11 October the Mission & Outreach committee voted to contribute an additional \$3,000 from the Mission & Outreach grant fund. Now \$6,000 from Epiphany is being donated to Episcopal Relief & Development and is earmarked specifically for aid to Haiti.

Disaster Chaplaincy

The book of Genesis tells us that the Creator made a “good” earth and all that is in it. And, though the goodness of the world is assured, the safety of the world is never guaranteed. Indeed, from the human perspective, the world is full of chaos, uncertainty, and dangers. Bad things happen with no explanation; the innocent suffer for no discernible reason. And much of the rest of scripture grapples with this basic fact. And we are still required to worship God – without the expectation of earthly reward or punishment. While this condition may vex us, we should ask ourselves what the world would be like if God always assured safety and justice without our effort. If the universe were structured in such a way that good was always rewarded and evil always punished, little need or motivation would exist for religion – or any moral or ethical thought at all.

So, bad things happen. This was at the core of training I received last February at the University of the South on Disaster Chaplaincy. This class sought to prepare ministers to offer pastoral care in disasters, disasters being events that overwhelm a community’s normal mechanisms to cope and respond. Weather catastrophes such as floods and hurricanes get the most attention, but human initiated disasters such as terrorist attacks and active shooter scenarios also command the cultural zeitgeist, although the number of people actually affected is smaller and, they are rare. But disasters can also be much smaller in scale – house and apartment fires are by far



At the heart of this course was another simple truth. God does not leave us on our own when bad things happen, and the most important thing God has done is to have given us each other. One revealing thing I learned in this course was that in any significant disaster, all of the heavy lifting is done by faith based organizations: churches, mosques, synagogues, the Salvation Army, the Red Cross. These groups provide the vast majority of services, volunteers, and materiel during a disaster and recovery. FEMA, the federal emergency bureau, state relief groups, and even local emergency services mostly provide communication and logistical support for these organizations. I was surprised and gratified to learn that houses of worship are the cornerstones of efforts to deal with the uncertain world. Perhaps God knows what God is doing, after all?

So, I asked myself, what can we do as the people called to be the Parish of the Epiphany to respond in disaster scenarios? The possible answer to this question takes two distinct directions. The first is how we would respond if we are directly affected by a local or regional disaster – a fire, or extreme weather, for example. How could we better prepare ourselves to continue our important work, worship, outreach, community support, and minister to those in our community who were hurt? Better yet, how could we anticipate and minimize the effects of such an event?

The second is how the Parish could assist in a large scale disaster where we were not directly affected, but our neighbors in surrounding communities were. We have many facilities, resources, and talents that would come in very handy in the case of a regional displacement of people: an industrial kitchen, a large building space that could be configured as a canteen or shelter, and many Parishioners trained in medical and pastoral care.

I am interested in pursuing the answers to both of these questions and would welcome a discussion among people who might also feel such a calling. As the Psalmist writes: "Be merciful to me, O God, be merciful to me, for in you my soul takes refuge; in the shadow of your wings I will take refuge, till the storms of destruction pass by. I cry out to God Most High, to God who fulfills his purpose for me."
